The Brightest Star in My Sky

One of my guiding stars went dark this summer. Biblical scholar, author, Civil Rights icon, and long-time Village resident, Everett Tilson, died a few weeks after he was diagnosed with cancer. He was 83. He was my mentor.

For the past six years, Everett and his wife, Mary, had lived in a home at our Willow Brook Christian Village. Mary now lives on with us in one of our healthcare facilities.

In those six years, I spent hours in Everett's living room or at his table. I always sat in a chair, but I was metaphorically at his feet. Tell me your stories, Everett. Instruct me, lead me, inspire me. Impart to me what you have come to learn about social ills and injustices.

Early on in life, Everett took up the cause of civil rights for American blacks who, since the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863, had been crushed under the heel of racism. He felt shame for a society that proclaimed "liberty and justice for all," and yet had closed out an entire race of people.

In the early 1960s, Everett was instrumental in starting the sit-in movement in Nashville, as he and other dissidents worked to break the back of segregation in America. In fact, he resigned his teaching position at Vanderbilt University partly to protest the expulsion of a black student leader of those sit-ins.

Everett was arrested and sat two nights in a Mississippi jail for attempting to integrate a Methodist church in Jackson. He marched with Martin Luther King, Jr., and thousands of others from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama. That night while on his way back to Ohio, he was chased out of Dixie by a carload of good old boys from the Ku Klux Klan.

I have never known anyone who was willing to lay down his life for a righteous cause. Everett was, and maybe nearly did that night.

I sought opportunities to bring my two sons into his light.



Lunches, dinners, jaunts with him to lectures at Ohio State. I wanted them to come to know a man who was driven by principle—a living, breathing maker of history.

Indeed, you can find his name in books that chronicle the history of the American Civil Rights movement.

Yet, Dr. Tilson was not universally loved, for his judgments were harsh, and he seemed not to care that he offended some who did not share his views. Such, though, is the way for a principled prophet who had made a difference.

This spring, a nagging pain in his back was diagnosed as a Cancerous tumor. He endured weeks of radiation treatments in a Columbus hospital before he was transferred to our Columbus nursing home one Saturday in late June. Monday evening after his move, I arrived home from work and told Janet that I hadn't seen Everett since his admission three days before. I'm stationed at one of our other facilities up the road and simply had not found time to drop by. I felt a burden to see him, so after dinner I drove to the Home and sat with him for the better part of an hour. He was mostly quiet, and there were long intervals of silence. As I rose to leave, I told him how much I admired him, and how grateful I was for all he had done for so many.

Out in the hall, I called an impromptu meeting with the nurses and aides who were on duty that night. I told them that they had no idea who was lying in the bed behind that door. I gave them a 120-second overview of his life's work.

Among seven staff members that night were three black aides. I looked directly at them, moving my eyes from face to face, and said, "You don't have to ride in the back of the bus today because of the sacrifice of that man and his fellow activists 40 years ago. He put his life on the line so you could live free."

As I turned to leave, all of them slipped quietly into his room. I don't know what was said, or if any words at all were exchanged.

When I arrived home, I told Janet that I didn't think Everett was going to make it. Next morning word came that he had died.

A ncient sailors set their course on the open sea by fixing on the stars. Sure, predictable, unchanging lights in the sky guided them to far-away ports. Those stars made the difference between purposeful sailing and mindless drifting. The brightest star in my sky has been extinguished, and my nights are now a little darker.

A few precious stars still dot my sky, but none are so bright and steady as Everett Tilson.

Cuts Threaten Care for Older Adults in Need

Por seven out of every ten residents of Willow Brook's skilled nursing centers, Medicaid is more than a government program, it is a Godsend.

The program that helps cover medical bills—including skilled nursing care for seniors without the means to pay—is implementing cuts that will devastate our ability to care for those who need us most, knocking out half a million dollars of income annually.

Medicaid has rarely fully covered the cost of nursing home care to its beneficiaries, but because Willow Brook's mission is to care for those in need, we have welcomed residents on Medicaid and aided our residents whose funds have been exhausted in applying for this program which is jointly funded by the state and federal governments.

Over the past few years we have responded to the challenge to our ministry by analyzing every aspect of our operations to reduce costs without sacrificing care. We have spoken with legislators, and sought new funding sources. But it appears that despite our best efforts, the State of Ohio is planning to eliminate nearly half a million dollars in Medicaid payments to Willow Brook starting this year.

Over the coming months you will be hearing more about the impact of the cuts, and we will encourage you to write to your legislators, contribute to needy resident funds, and to lend your helping hand in any way you can.
