Willow Brook has been the grateful recipient of some generous gifts lately, from the estates of residents and their families. including:



nome time back I was at the Columbus Convention Center for a two-day conference. I had come together in that cavernous complex with hundreds of colleagues from retirement communities across Ohio to be tutored on the finer points of senior services administration, to catch a

bit of reflected light from our coronated superstars, and to learn what frightening measures the government was plotting to make our collective lives even more miserable.

At one point between sessions, I stepped into a restroom – a huge noisy

one with thirty or more fixtures to accommodate the large herds that invade at breaks. Out from all the chatter and water sounds there came a call, "Larry Harris, how are you?!"

I turned and met the grinning face of a man who once had worked in one of Willow Brook's kitchens, a cook I had fired three years before. For good cause, I hasten to add. He clearly held no grudge, for he thrust out his hand in a welcoming gesture. I took it. We shook. We engaged eyes. "How are you, John?" I inquired. ("John" is not his real name.)

He broke eye contact, his smile faded, and he said, "You know, Larry, I always respected you. When you would pass through the kitchen, you always called me by name. I loved working at Willow Brook, and I'm embarrassed to tell you that I am homeless. I'm living at Faith Mission."

Faith Mission is a homeless shelter a few blocks down the way from where we were standing. God bless those good people running the mission who every night toss life

Hands down, the job duty I hate most is when I am forced to fire someone. It never gets easy. I confess that anytime I have terminated someone's employment - a blow that al-

> ways is a last resort - I feel pain knowing that I am wreaking financial havoc in a life. And I know that I am visiting injury upon an abased soul, and likely inducing panic as well.

With no thought, I pulled out my wallet and gave him all that I had on me - two twenties. Forty dollars. As I pressed the bills into his hand, tears filled his eyes and spilled down his face - silent tears that would abide no consolation. I patted his arm anyway. "Be strong, John," I whispered, paying no mind to the curious-minded conventioneers circulating around us.

I then turned and pushed through the door, back to my world of the comfortably employed.

T don't know why John is homeless and can't hold a job. Maybe he's an alcoholic, or an addict. Maybe he's schizophrenic. Maybe a stepfather abused him when he was five, and he just can't get over it. I don't know.

What I do know is that John is a brother, a child of God, a fellow passenger on Starship Earth as we glide in silence together across the cosmos on a path toward our eternal destiny.

And I know also that given an alternate hard turn of fortune, you or I could have been John.

Further, I believe that if Jesus were here in this present age, he wouldn't be hanging around those of us who have paychecks. You wouldn't find him in our churches or great halls of political power. He would be at Faith Mission, dishing up meals, embracing the unwashed vagabonds, healing their addictions, and mending their mental afflictions.



These gifts are thoughtful testaments to those residents who have in their passing shown their appreciation for the meaningful life and enduring friendships they enjoyed in their final home.




The estate of Wendell and Edith McCoy funded the creation of The McCoy Courtyard at Willow Brook Christian Home.

Willow Brook and Global Village Collection:

A Partnership that Saves People, Land, and Elephants

 ${\cal W}$ illow Brook supports fair trade and The Global Village Collection in Delaware, Ohio. Global Village is a sister not-for-profit organization with an honorable mission to provide education for children, employment at a living wage for their parents, and sustainable commerce for communities. Last year, after a successful fundraising event on their behalf, we began carrying their fair trade products in our newly-opened Market at Cafe 100. Global Village is our source for the jewelry, purses, accessories and other gift items in the Market.

Tagua is an ivory-like nut that is harvested from palm trees indigenous to the South American countryside. It can be cut, colored, beaded, and engraved. Beautiful jewelry is created from tagua, and we have several examples in the market.

Because of its similarity to ivory, purchasing tagua helps to discourage poaching, thereby reducing the slaughter of elephants. Demand for the hand-crafted tagua beads provides jobs for farmers and artisans, and tagua products encourage the growth and maintenance of the tagua palm, which promotes reforestation.

What fun - to provide a service for residents and guests, to practice good stewardship of Mother Earth, and to support fair trade, all the while saving elephants!
