ast April, while watching all the painful images of the Boston Marathon bombings, Janet and I talked of the uncertainty of life. The three spectators killed before our eyes that day had set out from home a few hours before with no inkling that the end was so near. Everything was fine up until the boom. Were they granted even a sliver of a moment to start a thought? Did they catch a panic flash of realization that this was the end? Or was it simply light one instant and lights out the next?

The biblical writer James was right: "...life is a vapor, that appears for a little time, then vanishes awav."

We have no promise of tomorrow, or this afternoon, or the next tick of the mantle clock. We possess this moment alone. Nothing more.

And when you consider all the ways there are to catapult us into the Great Beyond - a Boston bombing, the infestation of a malevolent microbe, a vital organ failure, a violent encounter with a Mack truck or one of our beloved firearms - it's a wonder any of us are still walking the planet.

But you and I, we are the survivors. For now.

Ye are all terminal, and we know it. Not one of us will walk off the stage of this curious Shakespearean drama called Life. We'll be carried feet-first. That is a guarantee.

We acknowledge this truth with a nod, but except maybe for a condemned Texas prisoner walking the green mile, or a cancer victim lingering at the far end of her passage, we contemplate death as some far-off appointment. Yes, it is out there, but it's so far up

A decade or so ago, I led a town meeting at our Willow Brook Christian Village where I had fielded a few barbed complaints from residents.

> When the meeting adjourned, I walked out of the assembly alongside apartment resident Dick Bauerle. In World War II, he was Captain Richard Bauerle. He had commanded a tank company in the Battle of the Bulge, Hitler's vicious last hurrah, where he watched in traumatized horror as many of his men were barbecued in their tanks by incendiary bombs and German flamethrowers.

The captain himself took a bullet to the head. He recovered, though, and even stood guard at the Nuremberg Trials where the worst of the Nazi war criminals were called to account.

As we exited the meeting, he said, "You know, they talked about cold soup at dinner and some weeds in the flower beds. What do they have to complain about? They're getting three squares a day. Nobody's shooting at them. Life is good."

God forgive me when I tender complaints in lieu of thanks. Forgive me when I dawdle away my precious hours. Forgive me when I fail to see each person I encounter as a brother or sister worthy of respect and honor. Forgive me when the last words that pass my lips as I exit my house each workday morning are anything other than, "I love you, Janet."
